MINUTES OF GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING OCTOBER 22. 1986

President Kay Smith opened the meeting at 7:35 P.M., with greetings and welcome to new faces. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as printed in the newsletter. The Treasurer's Report was given and approved. Kay explained the sudden change in program, saying it was inappropriate at this time to have Hal Whyte speak to the group. Hence the video show.

Under old business, Bill deProsse gave an updated report on scales, what's available and for how much. By far the most economical are a set of hydraulic pressure type scales. It was moved, seconded and approved that the club purchase a set.

Kay gave an update on the County Airport Ordinance. It is pretty much all settled and written, with one major hangup being autogas. This becomes a major issue since 80 octane is no longer available at Buchanan. The group working on the Ordinance has drafted a letter asking the Board of Supervisors to reconsider the autogas issue in light of the documentation showing that properly graded autogas is available.

She also touched on the Airport Access Plan -- getting onto and off the airport parking areas is becoming tougher due to security requirements, and it is probably going to get worse.

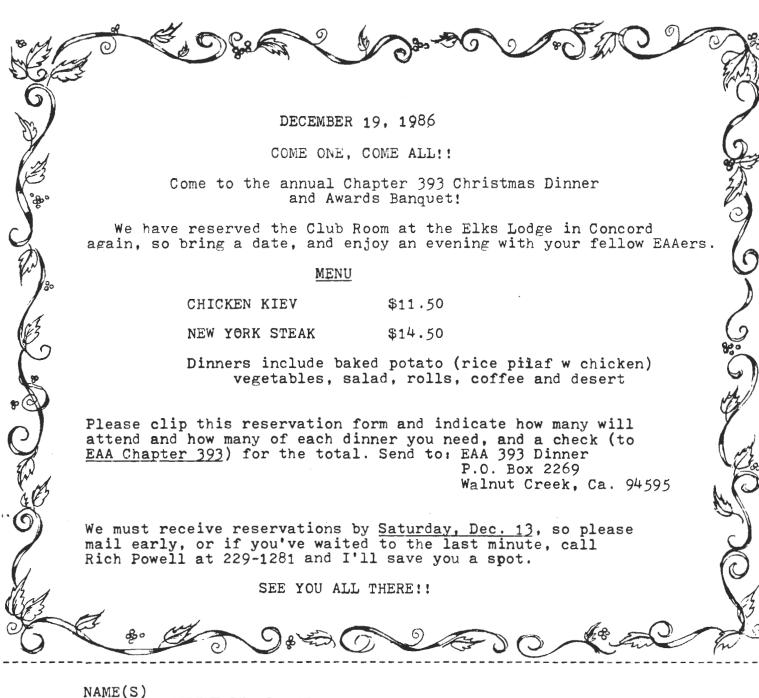
Noise complaints are up dramatically, some of it due to PSA's jets, some just increased frequency of complaints from the same areas. Avoid flying over schools!

Answers to Last Month's Quiz of the Month

You remember we had you and your passeenger stuck way out in the high Sierras with 15 items you had managed to save from your birdie as it sank through the ice into a lake. You are on the shore of the lake, 22 air miles from the nearest habitation in 7 in. of snow. Due to the circumstances of the particular flight you were on, you won't be missed for 2 weeks, and a couple of more feet of snow are expected in that time. Temperature runs 25 to 36 degrees in the daytime but can get to zero at night. Here are the 15 items, in order of their ranking by the Para Rescue Specialists, 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron, Canadian Forces Base, Summerside, Prince Edward Island, Canada:

- 1. 13 wood matches in a metal screwtop, waterproof container the single, most critical item. Protection from cold, and as a signal.
- 2. Hand axe continuous supply of wood will be necessary for fire, boughs for ground insulation, frame for shelter, possible butchering.
- 3. 20' \times 20' heavy duty canvas you will have to have protection from average winds of 13 15 knots. Spread over frame, could provide added warmth by fire, and could be spotted from the air.
- 4. Two sleeping bags A possible 14 mights in this area could render these a key factor in survival. Should be kept dry at all times
- 5. Gallon of maple syrup Source of quick energy to combat cold, and some nourishment. Just as important, the can is valuable for water gathering and cooking. Most plants are edible, especially after boiling. Don't eat snow, it dehydrates more than it slakes thirst. Melt ice rather than snow. Ice takes 50 percent less fuel to melt.
- 6. 250' of 1/4" braided nylon rope, 50 lb. test used to tie frame of shelter together, or support canvas, meat between trees. Fibers good for fishing line or net. Also good for traps, snares, and stringing a bow.

- 7. 1 pair snowshoes over-the-snow local travel, hunting. Can't go far as many streams are unfrozen, but if they do, they make for good travelling. Snow should have crust, soft snow is exhausting. Can make another pair and travel, but chances of survival are better by camping.
- 8. 1 punctured 14" aircraft inner tube slingshots. Birds are plentiful, even in winter. Rubber on fire makes immediate black smoke signal. Also various bindings & spring mechanisms for traps.
- 9. Safety razor kit with mirror most powerful tool for communicating if sun is out. In sun, a simple mirror can generate 5 7 million candle power. Razor blades good for cutting edge. Don't shave protection from elements.
- 10. Operating 4 battery flashlight emergency source of light, but mostly night signalling. Battery efficiency goes fast in cold, keep near fire.
- 11. Fifth of 151 proof rum anesthetic or disinfectant. High alcohol content helps start fire. Bottle good for water carrying. One shot before bed is a good morale booster.
- 12. Wind-up alarm clock several uses, some ruining the others. If kept as timepiece, use for fire watch, camp routines, and can navigate by finding North. (At 2:50 P.M. line up small hand with sun. North is centered between 7 and 8 position in North temperate zone.) Intact glass surface can be used as signal. If dismantled, internal workings can be used for fishing hooks and lures.
- 13. Magnetic compass can be used for direction finding, but be wary. In and around mountains local ore deposits can cause a lot of trouble. Magnetic compasses are best at sea, in the air and on most flat ground.
- 14. Book entitled, Western U.S. Air Navigation start fires, entertainment, toilet paper. Air navigation not too helpful on the ground. You got to walk a long way between checkpoints. Besides, a good portion of air navigation deals with stars, and <u>if</u> you travel, you can't travel at night.
- 15. Bottle of water purification tablets you have good water, but the bottle can be used for something. (Generally speaking, pond water is safer than river water.)

EAA's "Spirit of St. Louis" has been retired from flying status and will be placed in the EAA Air Museum. Cliff Robertson has loaned his MK IX Supermarine Spitfire to the EAA Air Museum. It was flown there by former RAF Ace Jerry Billing. What do you bet he put her through the paces on the way, just for old time's sake?

Speaking of that, I read where Chuck Yeager, on his recent record run with a light twin across the country, found he was so far ahead of schedule, he detoured a bit and buzzed his old home town in W. Va., just like he used to when he was stationed near there for a time during the war. (He wrote that in his book.)

Sen. Nancy Kassebaum's (R-Kansas) General Aviation Product Liability Reform Bill (S.2794) was finally voted out of committee and on to the Senate floor...only to encounter staunch opposition from Sen. Ernest Hollings (D-South Carolina). He was one of the founding members of the Association of Trial Lawyers of America. Well, the Association got all 60,000 members to oppose the bill in writing, (after all, it would hit them in their pocketbooks), all claiming it was "unfair to consumers". Unfortunately, EAA members were not as vocal and persistent in support of the fact that it is "fair to consumers" while perhaps "unfair to trial lawyers". While the views of the national aviation organizations are well known to Congress, it's the individual letters that count.

Shortly after the Cerritos, CA accident, FAA Administrator Donald Engenset up a task force to study TCA's. They came up with 40 recommendations. The top three are: increase penalties against private pilots; enlarge, simplify and make uniform all TCA's; and, upgrade all category II's to category I's, requiring Mode C altitude encoding transponders on \underline{all} traffic from ground level to infinity.

"Pass to the left of the tower." Very funny. Whose left, his or ours? Ever notice how much alike "left" and "west" sound?

From a flight incident report: "...circled airport and made left hand standard pattern. So much talk on UNICOM that I couldn't talk. People talking about airport celebration. I told people talking to talk trash on another frequency. One pilot said, "Amen." Another said, "Plane on final is talking to nobody." I said, "I don't have to." Another pilot told me to stick it in my par. I told that pilot to stick it in his. Other pilot stalked me to the ramp where I picked up two waiting passengers. The other unknown and unwanted pilot tried to board my aircraft in what appeared to be anger. My engines were both running so I blowed him off the wing to protect me and my passengers with max power and took off. Was very courteous to traffic in patteern." All participants in this imbroglio are hereby declared ineligible for the Fellowship of Flying, except perhaps, the one who said, "Amen".
