Big Brother is Watching!

I recently got a letter from the Oakland Airport's Noise/Environmental Compliance Office that my "aircraft was not flown in compliance with noise abatement procedures..." Upon inquiry, the office stated that "this particular departure nicked the edge of Alameda in the Fernside area...," but conceded that we actually "flew the procedure very well." What was startling was that they produced a drawing that purported to show our ground track as we departed. Now, I never supposed that taking off from Oakland was anything but public -- after all, we are in plain sight as well as talking to ATC and that is presumably recorded -- but I nevertheless felt my privacy invaded to learn that a permanent record was being made of our ground track, and I certainly had never been made aware of that fact. I am concerned that this process lacks the checks and balances that should be in place for such an operation. In this case, there is no disputing that ATC instructions take precedence over noise abatement procedures, but I doubt that ATC instructions are kept with other records of these events. So the pilot is subject to a monitoring operation where the "bad" evidence is kept, and the "good" evidence (which has priority) is discarded. (Letters are sent on a monthly cycle, more than two weeks after the event in my case -- ATC recordings are usually destroyed on a two-week cycle. And I doubt if access to the recordings would be easily granted, anyway.) My inquiry asked if these records were subject to inspection and correction; the response did not address these specific questions. In this case, the track was shown 400+ feet from the runway centerline; moving the track to the centerline turns the "nick" into a clear miss. Nevertheless, it looks remarkably accurate, and if we have to stay away from something, we might as well stay 1000 or more feet away. The major point is that this technology exists and is being used. Be aware!

Weapons of mass destruction -- NOT!

Sadly, the media, encouraged by the politicians, have identified small airplanes as significant terrorist threats, which they are not. This fear mongering has not abated as I thought it would. As pilots, we need to counter this misinformation as best we can. An important activity in this regard is our Young Eagles flights, and other opportunities to educate the general public about the realistic capabilities and threats of our small aircraft. Remember that truth and justice do not prevail without a lot of time, energy and money spent to promote it. Exercise your privileges -- fly as much as you are able, and tell everyone how wonderful it is.


