

As you can see the operations at Buchanan have plummeted over the last 10 or 20

years, for lots of reasons. However, this trend spells disaster for our chosen hobby/passion and if we don't find a way to get a lot more people interested in aviation, we might just find we have no place to fly out of, when at some point the county will stop putting resources into a vanishing sport.

At this point I'm suggesting that EAA Chapter 393 seriously consider changing it's focus to include some serious community involvement toward the goal of growing aviation locally. I believe that EAA is uniquely positioned to do this. If we don't, recreational aviation as we know it at Buchanan could be dead in as little as the next 10 years. Look at that graph again; it sure doesn't look like it is leveling off to me. If anything, it has been accelerating for the last 5 years and I've heard rumors that the pace is continuing to the present. Scary.

I just recently picked up a copy of the airport's proposed master plan for the future. They have pretty graphs showing operations growing well into the future. All of this appears to ignore the well defined trends of the last 20 years. Is this wishful thinking? You bet. However, at some point somebody has to get their hands dirty and do something to make this happen. I'm proposing that Chapter 393 step up and insist that the airport wake up and work with us to turn this mess around, and soon.

I believe that the first step in this process begins now with our coming out party to the business community. If you show up and share your passion for aviation with our guests, many of who have no idea what is possible, I see the possibility of infecting more people with our passion. If we can make the buzz start here, and I really believe that our members just sharing their passion for the sport can go a long way toward accomplishing this, we will have turned a corner.

I have been working on some proposals that I believe will enable us to start making some serious progress on the next step in the process. That means presenting the community with a much more accessible face and enabling some serious outreach and not just to the pilots of the future but to the new pilots of today. I'll share more on this later as developments warrant.

So please come to the mixer and share what makes aviation your passion. See you there.

President Ken McKenzie opened the meeting with a welcome for members and guests. Guests included (apologies in advance for mangling these names) Eric Shull, Dyan Waterman.

Business:

Ken noted a Fly In and Open House at Flabob (EAA Chapter 1) in Riverside on September 27. They are also hosting a biplane fly in on October 27.

Membership Chairman Bill McCoy noted the significance and importance of our upcoming (September 17th) "mixer" with the Pleasant Hill and Concord Chambers of Commerce.

Presentation: Bill Reining, An AirVenture Perspective

Bill noted that a number of EAA 393 Chapter members attended Air Venture, including himself, Ken McKenzie, Guy Jones, Pete Mitchell, and Don Baldwin. Bill flew to Milwaukee and drove to Oshkosh. He stayed with friends from Atlanta; they rent a house on the show grounds.

He spent time with airplane owners, particularly in the RV area. He visited the seaplane base, riding the bus there for \$2. The seaplane base is only open during the show, as it's on private property. It is a fantastic site for taking pictures. He attended the Saturday night Corn Roast there.

AirVenture publishes an AirVenture Program, an Information Guide and its own daily newspaper. The Information Guide contains a directory of both the Forums and the Vendor Booths. The daily newspaper had articles on current issues, including the 51% rule for homebuilders, and attractions, such as White Knight.

September 2, 2008

Attending: Ken McKenzie, Bill Reining, Dick Sperling, Harvard Holmes, Louis Goodell, Guy Jones, Pete Mitchell, Rick Bourgeois

1. Treasurer report (Louis Goodell) - \$1085.20 in checking; and \$2650.19 in savings. Upcoming expenses include \$200 for this meeting room, and \$200 for renewing our insurance with EAA National.

Bill Reining suggested that we assemble a more formal budget, showing projected income and expenses over the next year. This would allow him to budget money to subsidize speaker expenses for the Chapter meetings. This would also allow the members to provide more informed direction to the officers of the Chapter. Among other suggestions, it was proposed to make the monthly dinners an explicit money-raising project and increase the suggested donation to \$10.

2. Bill Reining reported that he is working on an ATC speaker for the next meeting, either from Concord Tower, NorCal or Travis Approach, or Oakland Center. It would be a good opportunity for them to cover Class B and other sensitive areas, runway incursions, VFR advisory services, and other issues.

In October, he would like to have a hands-on meeting/presentation/workshop

and he is looking for a volunteer with suitable facilities.

Additional speaker/presentation suggestions from the members are always welcomed. John Schwaner from Sacramento Sky Ranch and Jim Weir from RST Engineering were both recommended as good speakers.

3. Plans and preparations for the Chambers of Commerce "mixer" were reviewed. Ken McKenzie will meet with Bill McCoy on Saturday, since Bill was unable to attend this meeting. [This meeting took place Monday, 9/8/2008 – ed.]

Anyone who could come at 4:30 pm or so on Wednesday, September 17 to help us decorate and prepare for the "mixer" would be most welcome.

We reviewed the need for "talking points" as our members mix with the CC members. The EAA membership brochure makes a number of points about the benefits of membership.

We will have the AirVenture promotional movie showing, and also some slides of some construction projects.

- 4. Bill Reining pointed out the need to be more influential with local politicians and business leaders. We will need to attract the interest of people/entities with more money if we are to be successful in expanding our outreach to the community as outlined in our recent President's Perspective.
- 5. Our recently instituted light "dinners" before the meetings were reviewed. Several points were made:
- It has "morphed" from a potluck into more of a purchased food situation.
- More organization is needed.
- We need a list of menus to help organize the process.
- Maybe we should look at this as a fundraiser and increase the suggested donation a bit.
- We should query the members on what they would like to eat and to contribute.

• If we query the members, we might also get their views on other issues as well as update our demographics – current pilot status (sport, private, commercial, none, etc.), builder status (active, interested, no time, no interest, etc.), favorite activities (meetings, fly outs, picnics, B-17 event, Young Eagles, other).

Rick Bourgeois agreed to serve as the Dinner Coordinator. Please give him your support in getting our dinners better organized.


