1. Treasurer's report (Louis Goodell) - \$686.45 in checking; and \$2650.63 in savings. Wells Fargo has started charging us \$10/month for our checking account; Ken McKenzie will investigate getting this removed.

Harvard Holmes has promised to work on a budget.

2. We will meet at 181 John Glenn this month due to a prior reservation for the space at MDPA.

3. Bill Reining has arranged for Dave Saylor from *AirCrafters* in Watsonville to speak in November.

For February and beyond, Bill has some ideas from the San Jose Chapter, received at the recent Oshkosh Leadership Forum. Other possibilities are Jim Weir from RST engineering on antennas, Frank from Sterling Avionics on avionics for homebuilders, a Watsonville avionics expert also on avionics for homebuilders, maybe an update on the demise of leaded aviation fuel, and perhaps a talk from a local AME.
